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Dear Friends,

I believe we should always try to explain why we are raising money, what the equipment does and why it is needed. Since I don't have the medical knowledge needed to do this properly I usually call on Dr. Ian Mortimore of Cheltenham General Hospital and ask him to put the project into layman's language. This is how he explains portable Ultrasound scanners:

## Chest Ultrasound: Portable Sonosite Equipment

A common problem in respiratory medicine is the development of a pleural effusion. This is fluid which accumulates between the outside of the lung and the inside of the chest wall. The overall effect is to gradually compress the lung which can cause shortness of breath/discomfort.

There are many causes of pleural effusions and it is, therefore, important to be able to find the cause in each individual patient. In order to do this, we may need to sample the pleural fluid and / or drain it off completely. Until recently, these procedures were performed blind, based purely on clinical assessment with respect to the site and size of the pleural effusion. Ultrasound scanners allow us to visualise the effusion before we aspirate fluid or drain fluid off and we can then be sure we are passing needles and chest drains through the chest wall in the correct position. The ultrasound equipment should, therefore, improve patient safety with respect to investigation and treatment of pleural effusions. The improved patient safety associated with chest ultrasound has been recognised by The National Patient Safety Agency who now recommends its use.
